Things to have when your house catches fire

The brutal truth is that far more people die every year in house fires in Victoria than are killed in bushfires over an average decade.

A spate of house fires across Melbourne and in country Victoria earlier this year, some with fatal consequences, was a stark reminder of the need to take care around the home all year.

Most house fires start in the kitchen, with cooking being the major cause. Other causes include faulty wiring or electrical appliances, candles, smoking in bed and heating appliances.

It is important to teach children the danger of fire and to keep matches and lighters away from young children in particular.

There are three essential "haves" to surviving a house fire.

- 1. HAVE A WARNING:** Properly installed smoke alarms are essential ... check them regularly to make sure they work, that batteries are changed routinely and that the alarms are cleaned.
- 2. HAVE A PLAN:** Know what to do when there is a fire. Can it be safely fought by you with a fire blanket or extinguisher? Have an escape plan. Get



everyone out of the house and assembled at an agreed location. Call the fire brigade on 000.

3. HAVE A CLEAR ESCAPE PATH: Getting yourself and your family out is the key priority. Never deadlock doors from the inside – it is pointless as a security measure and puts you and your family in danger. Never re-enter a house once you have evacuated until the fire brigade indicates it is safe to do so.

Brigade wins national community safety award

A bushfire safety booklet produced by the Sassafras–Ferry Creek CFA brigade has won a prestigious national award for promoting community safety.

Living Safely with Bushfire, compiled and published by the brigade, won the pre-disaster category for volunteer organisations in the 2007 Emergency Management Australia Safer Communities Awards.

The award was presented at a ceremony at Parliament House in Canberra in February by Attorney-General Robert McClelland and Minister for Home Affairs Bob Debus. Brigade Captain John Schauble and Secretary Anna-Marie Shew, who jointly devised and produced the project along with designer Francis Bourke, accepted the award on behalf of the brigade.
